Pray: Focusing on the greatness of God is one tangible step we can take to encourage our hearts when we are tempted to be controlled by the fear of man. We saw Asa doing this as he cried to the Lord in verse 11. Read Isaiah 40: 25-31 now, a passage that speaks to the greatness and majesty of God. Write a prayer of response to the Lord, praising Him for His great power to help you when you are afraid.
DAY 5 Don't play the Fool
Pray: Psalm 20:7 says, "Some trust in chariots and some in horses, but we trust in the name of the LORD our God." Thank the Lord for the opportunities you have been given to trust Him. Ask Him now to help you to choose to trust Him instead of people in every circumstance that you face.
Memorize: Review our memory verse by writing it on the line. Then quote Psalm 46:1-3, 10 out loud to review the entire passage we have memorized so far.
Study: Each day we have the opportunity to trust the Lord in our circumstances. Though we may have trusted the Lord in the past, we must be careful to continue to follow Him with our whole hearts. Yesterday we saw how King Asa trusted the Lord in the midst of fearful circumstances. Today we will look at another event in Asa's life, when he should be trust man instead of the Lord. Regin by reading 2
look at another event in Asa's life, when he chose to trust men instead of the Lord. Begin by reading 2 Chronicles 16: 1-9. 1. What happened in the 36th year of Asa's reign? (vs 1)
2. What did Asa do? (vs 2-3)



3. What was the result for Asa and the people of Judah? (vs 4-6)
4. To the human eye, was there anything wrong with what Asa did? Why or why not?
5. According to the Lord, what was wrong with Asa's actions? (vs 7)
6. God's plan was more than King Asa could have imagined: to save the people of Judah by bringing them freedom from the Syrians. Because Asa did not consult the Lord, he did not understand God's purposes and he made a treaty with the very people that God wanted to defeat. Asa's actions may have appeared wise and even beneficial for the people of Judah, but not trusting the Lord ultimately caused Judah to be at war for much longer than they needed to be (vs 9). Why is it that God desires us to turn to Him in the face of fear rather than to people, no matter how logical our actions may appear?
7. It can be so easy for us to use our own wisdom or listen to the advice of others to make decisions without ever consulting the Lord. God has given us common sense that we need to use, and it is prudent to seek wise counsel when faced with hard choices, but God wants us to turn to Him first! Are you ever tempted to turn to your own wisdom or the wisdom of others without consulting the Lord? Tel about it on the lines below.
8. Verse 9 gives us an important truth about the Lord. What is it and how is it important to your life?
9. At the end of verse 9, the Lord tells Asa, "You have done foolishly in this." Not trusting God in every aspect of our life is to, literally translated, "play the fool". How would your actions be different if you daily recognized the foolishness of trusting in other people?





Pray : The Lord is eagerly looking to strengthen and support every person whose heart is fully committed to Him! Write a prayer of response to the Lord now. In it tell the Lord of your desire to turn
to Him in every circumstance. Confess any times that you have turned to people instead of to Him. Ask Him for the strength to follow Him with your whole heart.
